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Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, 4th June 2023 (Pages 81 in new orange Mass Book) (Year A for Sundays) (Cycle 2 for weekdays)

Dear Parishioners

Last weekend I was in Liverpool for a celebration of my 75th birthday and 50th anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood, hosted by my family. As well as family: my sisters, brother-in-law, cousins, niece, nephews and great nieces and nephews, there were friends from childhood, school and seminary. One friend travelled all the way from the United States. It was a nice surprise. Also joining the celebration were Archbishop Malcolm and priest friends and a group from Liverpool Hope University. I am having another celebration with parishioners here on the Island on Sunday 18th June, just two days after the actual date of my ordination anniversary. As required, on reaching the age of 75, I have offered my resignation to Archbishop Malcolm. We have agreed that I will gradually relinquish my extra archdiocesan responsibilities and then continue as parish priest for a further period depending on my health.

At the time of my ordination in 1973 the church marked the Feast of Pentecost with an octave. The eight days leading up to the Feast of the Holy Trinity were celebrated as if they were the day of Pentecost itself. Ordinations took place the day before Trinity. Those being ordained spent the week in retreat. During that silent retreat I recall the sense of being surrounded by the Holy Spirit. Trinity Sunday has always been a special day for me. Over the years I have come to understand that **the ancient doctrine of the Holy Trinity reveals God as RELATIONSHIP.** God is fluid and changing but never-changing at the same time. God is faithful and reliable. God moves with us but also calls us out of ourselves towards himself. God reveals himself to us but also waits for us to find him. At the same time God is deep within us.

North American Franciscan Fr Richard Rohr reflects on the Holy Trinity as follows:

The notion of God as Trinity is the foundation of all Christian thought, and yet it never has been - not truly! Our dualistic minds largely shelved the whole thing because we simply couldn't understand it. Most Christians do not consciously deny the Trinity, but as Karl Rahner (1904–1984) wrote, **"We must be willing to admit that, should the doctrine of the Trinity have to be dropped as false, the major part of religious literature could well remain virtually unchanged."** What a sad statement on our fundamental understanding of God!

The Trinity reveals God more as a verb than a noun, but we rarely speak about God that way in either our preaching or our prayers. God is three "relations," which itself is mind-boggling for most believers. Yet that clarification opens up an honest notion of God as Mystery who can never be fully comprehended with our rational minds. God is dynamic - a verb rather than a static name.

The shape of God is the shape of everything in the universe! Everything is in relationship and nothing stands alone. Trinitarian theology says that God is a "circular" rotation (perichoresis) of total outpouring and perfect receiving among three intimate partners. Historically, most of us, except for mystics, preferred the pyramid model with God the Father at the top, which then got imitated and promoted all the way down! This is no exaggeration.

I give Anglican priest-poet, Malcolm Guite, the last word:

In the Beginning, not in time or space, But in the quick before both space and time, In Life, in Love, in co-inherent Grace, In three in one and one in three, in rhyme, In music, in the whole creation story, In His own image, His imagination, The Triune Poet makes us for His glory, And makes us each the other's inspiration. He calls us out of darkness, chaos, chance, To improvise a music of our own, To sing the chord that calls us to the dance, Three notes resounding from a single tone, To sing the End in whom we all begin; Our God beyond, beside us and within. **Lourdes Youth Quiz Night** will take place on **FRIDAY 16 JUNE** at **7.30pm** in the **Columba Club**.
