Dear Parishioners

The hymn 'O Lord my God when I in awesome wonder' is one of my favourites, but maybe that's because it has a great tune. The second verse states 'And when I think that God, His Son not sparing; sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in; that on the cross, my burden gladly bearing, **He bled and died to take away my sin**.' Another modern hymn with a beautiful tune is 'In Christ alone'. It has the line 'On that cross as Jesus died, the wrath of God was satisfied'.

Why did God become Human? Why did Jesus die? Most of us were brought up to believe that Jesus died because of our sins. It's called the atonement or scapegoat theory. Was it only because we have sinned or did God have other reasons from the very beginning? In the thirteenth century, the Franciscans and the Dominicans took opposing positions on this question in the universities of Paris, Cologne and Oxford.

The Dominicans, represented by **St Thomas Aquinas** (1225–1274), felt they were being faithful to the Scriptures and Jewish temple metaphors of sacrifice, price and atonement. On the other hand, the Franciscan **Blessed John Duns Scotus** (c. 1266–1308), who held chairs of theology at Oxford and Paris, said that Jesus' crucifixion didn't change God's mind about us. God's mind didn't need changing. He challenged the view that Christ was a 'Plan B' after Adam and Eve sinned, which is the way most people seem to understand the significance of Jesus' death and resurrection. He said that Christ was 'Plan A' from the very beginning (see Colossians 1:15–20; Ephesians 1:3–14; John 1:1–18). Scotus claimed that the **mystery of Incarnation was not motivated by a 'problem' to be put right but by** *love.* **God became man to show us how much the Father loves us. Christianity is founded on love and freedom from the very beginning.**

Although once called 'the Queen of the Sciences', theology is not an exact science. It is an attempt to describe the indescribable. St Anselm (1033-1109) wrote a treatise 'Cur Deus Homo?' (Why did God become Man?) He once described theology as 'faith seeking understanding'. The church constantly refines its understanding of the depths of our faith. Each of us in our own lives also seeks to make sense of the mystery of God's love. This week we are aware of the terrible suffering of the people of Libya and Morocco, a challenge we shared with our young people preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. Only our faith tells us that God is with them in their suffering.

This Tuesday 19 September there will be Mass in St Mary's School at 9.30am to mark the beginning of the new school year. All welcome.
