The Epiphany of the Lord

(Year B for Sundays) (Cycle 1 for weekdays)



Dear Parishioners

We've had a wet Christmas. 'This is Happiness', is a novel by Noel Williams. Set in Faha, an imaginary village in County Clare, he could as easily be describing rain in the Isle of Man

It had stopped raining.

Nobody in Faha could remember when it started. Rain there on the western seaboard was a condition of living. It came straight-down and sideways, frontwards, backwards and any other wards that God could think of. It came in sweeps, in waves, sometimes in veils. It came dressed as drizzle, as mizzle, as mist, as showers, frequent and widespread, as a wet fog, as a damp day, a drop, a dreeping and an out-and-out downpour. It came the fine day, the bright day and the day promised dry. It came at any time of the day and night; and in all seasons, regardless of calendar and forecast, until in Faha your clothes were rain and your skin was rain and your house was rain with a fireplace. It came off the grey vastness of an Atlantic that threw itself against the land like a lover once spurned and resolved not to be so again. It came accompanied by seagulls and smells of salt and seaweed. It came with cold air and curtained light. It came like a judgement, or, in benign version, like a blessing God had forgotten he had left on. It came for a handkerchief of blue sky, came on westerlies, sometimes — why not? — on easterlies, came in clouds that broke their backs on the mountains in Kerry and fell into Clare, making mud the ground and blind the air. It came disguised as hail, as sleet, but never as snow. It came softly sometimes, its spears turned to kisses, in rain that pretended it was not rain, that had come down to be closer to the fields whose green it loved and fostered, until it drowned them. All of which, to attest to the one truth: in Faha, it rained.

But now it had stopped.

This weekend the magic of Christmas lingers as we celebrate the arrival of the Three Kings, Twelfth Night, the Feast of the Epiphany. Once again Anglican priest-poet Malcolm Guite has a verse for the occasion. It suggests that, as outsiders, we have much in common with the Magi. Their searching is our searching, too.

It might have been just someone else's story,
Some chosen people get a special king.
We leave them to their own peculiar glory,
We don't belong, it doesn't mean a thing.
But when these three arrive they bring us with them,
Gentiles like us, their wisdom might be ours;
A steady step that finds an inner rhythm,
A pilgrim's eye that sees beyond the stars.
They did not know his name but still they sought him,
They came from otherwhere but still they found;
In temples they found those who sold and bought him,
But in the filthy stable, hallowed ground.
Their courage gives our questing hearts a voice
To seek, to find, to worship, to rejoice.

I have been overwhelmed by the many cards, gifts and kindnesses that I have received from parishioners this Christmas. Thanks to the many people who help around the parishes, not just at Christmas, but all the year round. I really appreciate your support. Christmas is busy but it's the best time of year to be a priest. I wish you every blessing for the New Year. May it be a year of peace and justice throughout the world. *Fr John*

Over Christmas we invited people to place the names of those whom they would be missing, in a basket, at the foot of the Christmas Tree, in both of our churches. The response has been amazing. There is something sacred about our names. They define who we are. Every Baptism ceremony begins with the question 'What name do you give your child?' This is the name by which we will be known for all eternity. On each of our altars where Mass is celebrated, a book lies open listing the names of those who are sick, those who have died and those with anniversaries. It is updated each week. During Covid we received almost daily emails from people asking for the names of the sick and the dead to be mentioned at Mass, names from people all over the world. The reading aloud of these names of those we love means they are not forgotten. They rest in the heart of God.
