Dear Parishioners

I spoke last week of the death of **Alexei Navalny** and linked his death to the events of Holy Week. I made that connection while ignorant of Navalny's personal beliefs. This week I read the following report from **Canon Robin Gibbons,** a Catholic priest of the Eastern Rite: '*Alexei Navalny's death is a challenge to my Lent, a step into the bewildering chaos of human existence, where good and bad intermingle, but alas where good, justice and righteousness that seem to be so elusive for humans, animals and for our Earthly home itself sometimes is given hope'.*

'At a court appearance in January 2021, Alexei Navalny revealed he was no longer an atheist, and in public quoted the words of Jesus as found in Matthew 5 :6; "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied". His conversion, extraordinary steadfastness and dark sense of humour in prison and through all his trials, sheds another light on his life and a meaning to his death, particularly as somebody who as I have noted, also embodies in an analogous way, our Lenten journey and now as an example of martyrdom for the sake of justice and righteousness. He said at that trial hearing in January 2021: "Even though our country is built on injustice and we all constantly face injustice..... we also see that millions of people, tens of millions of people, want righteousness. They want the righteousness and sooner or later they will have it.'

Saturday, 24 February marks the second anniversary of the full-scale invasion of Ukraine by Russia. It's a conflict that has slipped from the headlines, but the fighting remains intense and the suffering is great. **Bishop Nowakowski**, who looks after the UK's Ukrainian Catholic Community, raises the plight of Ukraine's people, but is quick to call for prayer for **the suffering of the Holy Land caught up in the conflict in Gaza**.

He also emphasises that, although we live miles away from the conflict, during this Lenten time of fasting and almsgiving, the other main pillar of the season - prayer - is where our focus should lie: *'We can't help everybody throughout the world with our limited means, but surely we can pray.* **Pray for peace, pray for justice, pray for those who are alone. Pray for those who are suffering - especially for those who are suffering separation.** We think of the families that have been torn apart because of the war in Ukraine, the tens of thousands of young women who have fled to the United Kingdom with their children while their husbands have had to remain behind to defend Ukraine.'

'We see the horrific news coming out of the Holy Land, the suffering that's happening there, both for the Israelis and Palestinians. We see the suffering of the Ukrainian people. So, during this time of Lent, this journey towards the Resurrection of Christ, we're asked three things. We're asked to intensify our prayer. We're asked to abstain or fast. We're also asked to give alms to remember those who are in need. **Maybe we can't help everybody throughout the world with our limited means, but surely we can pray.'**

Pope Francis' Ash Wednesday Homily 2024

At the beginning of Lent, Jesus invites each one of us to "go into our inner room," Pope Francis said in his homily for Mass on Ash Wednesday 2024.

"Going into your inner room", means returning to the heart... going from without to within, so that our whole life, including our relationship with God, "reflects the reality of our inner being."

The Pope said that Lent offers us the opportunity to "go back" to our authentic selves, removing all the masks and illusions that we too often wear.

This, he said, is why "in a spirit of prayer and humility, we receive ashes on our head". The ashes remind us we are dust, but dust that is loved and preserved by God: "The ashes placed on our head invite us to rediscover the secret of life" and allow us to feel ourselves to be loved by God "with an eternal love." The traditional Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, he said, "are not mere external practices, but paths that lead to the heart, to the core of our Christian life." It is precisely in the secret chamber within each one of us "that the Lord has descended in order to heal and cleanse us."

"Let us enter into our inner chamber," Pope Francis pleaded. "There the Lord dwells, there our frailty is accepted, and we are loved unconditionally." *Fr John*
