Dear Parishioners

We've all been moved by recent events in **Southport**; the violent loss of innocent life so close to home. Southport is part of our Archdiocese. The anguish of the parents of the three little girls and of the critically injured is unimaginable. It brings home to me the horror of innocent young lives lost in Gaza, in Israel, in Ukraine and in other parts of the world. I'm almost immune to the sight of grieving parents on my TV screen and it takes an event like Southport to make me realise how great their suffering must be. There is something perverse in human nature that allows resentment to feed into hatred. Social media encourages fear and suspicion to lead to violence. We rely on our leaders to have the courage to calm this escalation of outrage and evil. There are leaders who thrive on traumatic events and manipulate them for their own advantage.

This week Pope Francis stressed the importance of leadership and good politics. "Today, politics doesn't have a very good reputation: corruption, scandals, distant from people's day-to-day lives." The Pope's words seem to say what many of us are thinking – that politics is a dirty business in the hands of those who only think of getting rich or holding power. Pope Francis is saying something different; that another type of politics is always possible, at the service of the people, in particular, of the poorest. We all need "good politics," The temptation to get rid of politics, often raised by populists of every type, is a huge delusion. Pope Francis recalls the words of **Pope Paul VI who defined politics as "one of the highest forms of charity because it seeks the common good**."

This is why Christians, especially the laity, are called to participate in political life, to collaborate in building a more just and supportive society. *"Individuals can help others in need, when they join together in initiating social processes of fraternity and justice for all, they enter the 'field of charity at its most vast, namely political charity."* Pope Francis wrote, reflecting on this theme in his encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* (2020). In his message, Pope Francis asserts that **good politics** is not "holed up in huge buildings with large hallways," but "listens to what is really going on," is "at the service of the poor," and is "concerned about the unemployed." When a politician does not allow space for dialogue, cooperation and the commitment to the dignity of people – key aspects that the **Pope** emphasizes in *Fratelli Tutti* – the integral development of society is not achieved. Problems such as hunger, poverty, war, or the environmental crisis, to name a few, continue to be exacerbated due to egotistical and power-hungry political leadership.

Some weeks ago, I wrote of the New Translation of the Scripture Readings at Mass. We are obliged to introduce the new Lectionary on the 1st Sunday of Advent, 1st December 2024. We have been asked to help parishioners prepare for this change. Prior to Covid we had a series of regular evenings 'Reflections on the Word'. They were well supported. We considered how our everyday lives are enriched by the scripture readings on successive Sundays. Fidelity to the original versions of the Word of God in Hebrew and Greek present particular challenges. At every Mass we ask ourselves what God is saying to us in the readings. The readings are a mirror that the Holy Spirit holds before us to help us recognise his voice in the circumstances of our lives. Revival of these evenings of reflection will provide an opportunity to tell the story of the new 'English Standard Version Catholic Edition' and to experience at first-hand how it differs from the existing 'Jerusalem Bible' version. These sessions will be of interest to our Readers at Mass as well as to those who simply want to deepen their understanding of the scriptures. The first of these sessions will take place at 7.00pm on Wednesday 18th September at St Anthony's Pastoral Centre, Onchan.

Last Sunday Archbishop Malcolm spoke of the Adoremus Eucharistic Pilgrimages taking place on Saturday 21st September at both the Metropolitan Cathedral of Christ the King and the Cathedral Church of Saint Mary of the Isle Douglas. Our day of Eucharistic Adoration starts at 10.00am at St Mary's and finishes with the usual 5.00pm Saturday evening Mass. The pilgrimage is for parishioners from all our Catholic churches on the Island. St Anthony's Onchan and St Mary of the Isle parishes will take care of the period from 10.00am to 12noon; St Patrick's Peel and Our Lady Star of the Sea & St Maughold Ramsey from 12.00 to 2.00pm; and St Mary's Castletown and St Columba's Port Erin from 2.00pm until 4.00pm. St Mary of the Isle and St Anthony's will also take care of the final hour until Mass at 5.00pm. This year's Novena to Mary Untier of Knots will take place from Sunday 13th October to Monday 21st October. More details later.

Eucharistic Ministers are required to have their ministry periodically renewed. This involves a formal training session and recommissioning ceremony with the presentation to each minister of a *pagella* or certificate signed by the Archbishop authorising their ministry. This is required if they wish to continue in their role. A day of renewal was last held in November 2019. **Elizabeth Parsons,** Director of the Pastoral Development Department **and Mark Robson** are travelling to the Island to conduct a **Training and Recommissioning event on Saturday 5th October.** Further details will be announced after the holiday period. Please record this date in your diaries. All Eucharistic Ministers are requested to attend. *Fr John*
