Dear Parishioners

It was good to welcome Father Sean Riley once again. His visit enabled me to visit my sisters. My sister Michele's health continues to cause concern. I also managed a couple of days in brilliant sunshine in North Wales. A canon lawyer, Fr Sean serves as Chancellor to the Archdiocese and is responsible for issuing dispensations and other official documents on the Archbishop's behalf. He also has a role with the Archdiocesan Marriage Tribunal which deals with marriage annulments. Fr Sean wore a mask last week while distributing Holy Communion. It's a reminder to us all that the situation regarding Covid continues. Many of those who regularly attend Mass are vulnerable. Even if they have no on-going health issues themselves, a fair number are carers for family members at home whose immunity and resistance to infection is diminished, especially if they are undergoing chemotherapy for instance. For those with an existing health condition, a Covid infection can be enough to put their health into a downward spiral. We accept sanitising our hands, restrictions on receiving Holy Communion on the tongue and the availability of Holy Water, not for ourselves, but for the health, safety and wellbeing of those at risk. As a Christian community we forego our own preferences and accept a higher standard of caution for the sake of the vulnerable.

At the height of summer there is normally a shortage of news as the world takes a break. Traditionally it's the 'silly season' when journalists dream up issues to fill the media while politicians take to the beach. This summer has been different. The appalling tragedy in Southport was followed by rioting in England and the North of Ireland. The bloodshed and destruction in Gaza and Ukraine is unabated. These events demonstrate both the worst but also the best in human nature. We all have a tendency to blame others when bad things happen. And there are people who are ready to apportion blame in line with their prejudices. Our faith encourages us not to lose faith in the goodness of God and the potential goodness of others. As Fr Richard Rohr puts it 'Everyone's an infinitely loved broken person in a fleeting, often not-so-fair, gorgeous, lovely, unexplainable world.'

Adoremus Eucharistic Pilgrimages are taking place on Saturday 21st September at both the Metropolitan Cathedral of Christ the King and the Cathedral Church of Saint Mary of the Isle Douglas. Our day of Eucharistic Adoration starts at 10.00am at St Mary's and finishes with the usual 5.00pm Saturday evening Mass. The pilgrimage is for parishioners from all our Catholic churches on the Island. St Anthony's Onchan and St Mary of the Isle parishes will take care of the period from 10.00am to 12noon; St Patrick's Peel and Our Lady Star of the Sea & St Maughold Ramsey from 12.00 to 2.00pm; and St Mary's Castletown and St Columba's Port Erin from 2.00pm until 4.00pm. St Mary of the Isle and St Anthony's will also take care of the final hour until Mass at 5.00pm.

This year's **Novena to Mary Untier of Knots will take place from Sunday 13**th **October to Monday 21**st **October.** More details later.

Eucharistic Ministers are required to have their ministry periodically renewed. This involves a formal training session and recommissioning ceremony with the presentation to each minister of a *pagella* or certificate signed by the Archbishop authorising their ministry. This is required if they wish to continue in their role. A day of renewal was last held in November 2019. **Elizabeth Parsons,** Director of the Pastoral Development Department **and Mark Robson** are travelling to the Island to conduct a **Training and Recommissioning event on Saturday 5th October.** Further details will be announced after the holiday period. We remember in our prayers **Jimmy Wall** who died recently. We think of his grieving family and friends who mourn his loss. May he rest in peace.

During the Angelus on the Feast of the Assumption, Pope Francis entrusted the worry and sorrow of people suffering due to conflict and war to Mary Queen of Peace. He recalled the grave humanitarian crisis in Gaza and remembered all the peoples of the Middle East, Ukraine, Sudan and Myanmar.

Following the recitation of the Angelus prayer, Pope Francis turned his thoughts to the suffering in so many parts of the world due to conflicts and wars. He recalled the peoples of Ukraine, the Middle East, Palestine, Israel, Sudan and Myanmar. And he prayed that "Mary Queen of Peace, whom we contemplate today in the glory of Paradise, may obtain for all, consolation and a future of serenity and harmony."

The Pope prayed in particular for the suffering people of Gaza where the humanitarian crisis has reached catastrophic levels. He appealed for "a ceasefire on all fronts, for the release of hostages and for aid to the exhausted population." He also encouraged every effort to avoid any escalation in the conflict and that "paths of negotiation" be pursued so this tragedy can be stopped. He punctuated his remarks again, reminding all that war always marks a defeat.
