

Dear Parishioners

A new phrase has entered my vocabulary: 'Christmas Creep'. It describes how Christmas preparations and celebrations commence earlier and earlier each year. This year some Christmas trees and lights appeared in late October. We usually blame the Americans for the commercialisation of everything from Mother's Day to Halloween. When it comes to Christmas, however, their celebration of Thanksgiving puts a break on 'Christmas Creep'.

In the United States the last Thursday in November is Thanksgiving Day. Working alongside north American priests in Peru for several years I came to appreciate its significance. It's a wonderful occasion when families gather for a meal. It's not commercialised. There are no presents and decorations. Just nice food – always including turkey and pumpkin pie. The British speak of being 'Home for Christmas' – it's 'Home for Thanksgiving' in the USA. For them it's the busiest day of the year on the roads and for airports. Many Americans then spend Christmas on holiday away from home – skiing or chasing the sun.

Thanksgiving is always on a Thursday. The following day, (Friday) signals the start of the Christmas rush. We've been introduced to this with what's now known as 'Black Friday'. On this day in the USA Christmas shopping starts with a vengeance, but it's now on Amazon rather than in the shopping mall.

The early start to Christmas in recent years is perhaps due to the depressing times in which we live. Covid, climate change, the cost of living and the daily toll of death and destruction in Ukraine and Gaza drag us down. The Christmas tree lifts our spirits. Christmas is about hope – even for the non-religious. This can be a challenge to those of us still attached to the Church's liturgical calendar.

This week we've had painters in the presbytery. I'm reminded again that most of their time and effort goes into the preparation. The actual painting is only the final step. Advent's a bit like that. We prepare for the coming of Christ. We long in hope for the Messiah. When he comes, he connects. Skimping the preparation can reduce the impact of the feast.

Today, the First Sunday of Advent, is the day when we hear **the new translation of the scripture readings at Mass.** We have purchased **new red Sunday missals** which include the full three-year Sunday cycle of readings in one volume. They replace the set of six mass books which had to be changed every six months. We anxiously awaited their arrival. They came just in time for this Sunday, the last consignment arriving on Friday morning. Each missal was individually wrapped. Thanks to those who undertook the laborious task of unpacking hundreds of missals and inserting labels in each stating 'Property of St Anthony's Onchan' and 'Property of Cathedral Church of St Mary of the Isle, Douglas'. Since the 1960s the **Jerusalem Bible** translation has been used throughout the British Isles. From this Sunday our readings are now taken from the **English Standard Version.** Interestingly, the Irish Bishops have agreed to stick with the Jerusalem Bible translation. It's cost us (St Anthony's and St Mary's) over £6000 to make the change. The pages in the new missals are flimsy and not suitable for young children to handle.

It was a sad moment to read from the Jerusalem Bible for the last time at St Anthony's on Thursday morning and St Mary's on Friday. I put the now obsolete lectionaries in the back of the sacristy cupboard with a heavy heart. The new lectionaries are beautifully produced but I have a special affection for the Jerusalem Bible. Not only do I know much of it by heart but it was translated by a team led by Liverpool priest and internationally recognised scholar **Fr Alexander Jones**. He taught me RE as a small boy and was in my Dad's class at school. I'm going to stipulate in my will that the Bible to be placed on my coffin at my funeral should be my well-worn sixty-year-old copy of the Jerusalem Bible. (I've had it rebound twice). *Fr John*

To help us prepare for Christmas, there will be an **Advent Service** on **Wednesday 18 December** at **7.00pm** in **St Mary's Church.** We will reflect with **Mary Untier of Knots** on the coming birthday of her Son, accompanied by our choir.
