

### **Dear Parishioners**

Last week we celebrated the **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.** We renewed our Baptismal promises, the promises our parents and godparents made on behalf of those of us baptised as babies. Last Sunday many of you took a small bottle of **Holy Baptismal Water** home with you as a reminder of the promises you renewed. This week we invite **Eucharistic Ministers** who take Holy Communion to the **Sick and Housebound** to take one of the remaining bottles to each of them. Parishioners are encouraged to save their Holy Water bottle so that if they seek Holy Water in the future they can fill their own bottle with water at home and bring it to the priest to bless after Mass.

Today's Gospel reading tells the story of the **Marriage Feast at Cana**. This event is only recorded in John's Gospel. He describes how Jesus changed the water into wine as a **sign**. John tells us that Jesus 'manifested his glory' and 'his disciples believed in him'. It's the first of seven signs in John's Gospel. These include the Feeding of the Five Thousand and the Raising of Lazarus. The response to each of these events is always the same: his followers believe. The final sign was the Resurrection, an event Thomas the Apostle had difficulty in believing. But when the Risen Jesus shows him his wounds Thomas says: '**My Lord and my God'**, words we can make our own. John explains: 'These words are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.'

This year, the Holy Year, we **celebrate 1,700 years** since the **Council of Nicea**. It's another opportunity to look afresh at our faith. Over 200 bishops were called together in 325 AD by the Emperor Constantine. The ancient city of Nicea is the modern city of <u>Iznik</u> in Turkey. This Council was convened to determine the relationship between Jesus and the Father. The resulting **Nicene Creed** was agreed by the bishops in response to those who questioned the divinity of Christ. It's one of two creeds that we recite at Mass each Sunday.

Jesus Christ is described in the Nicene Creed as "*Light from Light, true God from true God*", proclaiming his divinity. Jesus Christ is said to be "*begotten, not made*", asserting that he was not a mere creature, brought into being out of nothing, but the true Son of God, brought into being "from the substance of the Father". Jesus Christ is said to be "of one substance with the Father", proclaiming that although Jesus Christ is "true God" and God the Father is also "true God", they are "of one substance" – "consubstantial with the Father". The Nicene Creed is recognised by the Catholic, Orthodox and major Protestant churches. It is a profession of faith that unites us.

It is suggested that we look at this foundational creed as we begin the **annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity** from this Saturday, January 18th to Saturday, January 25th. Whatever divides the mainstream Christian denominations, we are united in our commitment to the core truth of our faith, that **Jesus is the Son of God.** 

Today is also **PEACE SUNDAY**. Our prayers are focussed on an end to the violence, loss of life and destruction in GAZA and UKRAINE. Together with the inauguration of the new President of the United States, these are critical days in world affairs. Today **Pope Francis** has a special message for all people of goodwill:

"At the dawn of this New Year given to us by our heavenly Father, a year of Jubilee in the spirit of hope, I offer heartfelt good wishes of peace to every man and woman.... At the beginning of this Year of Grace, I would like to offer **three proposals** capable of restoring dignity to the lives of entire peoples and enabling them to set them out anew on the journey of hope....

- First, I renew the appeal launched by Saint John Paul II on the occasion of the Great Jubilee of the Year 2000 to consider **"reducing substantially, if not cancelling outright, the international debt** which seriously threatens the future of many nations".
- I would like once more to propose a concrete gesture that can help foster the culture of life, namely **the** elimination of the death penalty in all nations.

In addition, following in the footsteps of Saint Paul VI and Benedict XVI...In this time marked by wars, let us use at least a fixed percentage of the money earmarked for armaments to establish a Global Fund to eradicate hunger and facilitate in the poorer countries educational activities aimed at promoting sustainable development and combating climate change..... The future is a gift meant to enable us to go beyond past failures and to pave new paths of peace."

### **Prayer for Peace**

God of mercy and compassion, where I have not loved my neighbour as I love myself, or done to others what I would have them do to me, held grudges, or tried to get even after I have been hurt: Father forgive. Grant us your peace, that I might know peace within myself, seek to be a peacemaker in my daily life, grow in my conviction that we are all made in your image, love those I find it hard to love, forgive injuries and refuse to retaliate, and follow in the footsteps of the non-violent Jesus. Amen. (Pax Christi, 2025)
